Though one of the key messages from the Holocaust was “Never Again”, genocide and crimes against humanity continue to the present day. **From Nuremburg to The Hague: Coming to Justice?** challenges participants to take a reflective and critical look at how perpetrators of some of the world’s most heinous crimes have been addressed at the international level. This seminar will examine the work of the International Court of Justice (ICJ), the International Criminal Tribunal for the former Yugoslavia (ICTY), and the International Criminal Court (ICC) all located in The Hague.

The primary aim of the seminar is to provide participants with the knowledge and tools to address issues relating to justice and injustice, genocide, and crimes against humanity. The seminar will focus for the most part on two particular tribunals and their context: The War Crime Tribunals at Nuremburg after WWII and either the ICTY or ICC, depending on the current cases before the court.

The seminar integrates methodology and content. Attending teachers will be provided with concrete activities and tools to be used in the classroom. **UNM students can receive 1 credit hour in Anthropology for the Fall Semester. Please contact Dr. Shirley Heying at sheying@unm.edu.**
